Course Description: To enable the students to understand the architectural style which prevailed in the ecclesiastical architecture during the Medieval period and during the Renaissance era in Europe. A proper understanding of the past historical periods of the Roman, Byzantine and the early Christian periods is an essential basic.

Course Objectives: The major eras from the Romanesque period, the smooth transistion from the early Christian era and the achievements made by these gregarious builders in terms of scale, structure and texture. The use of arches and arcading, vaulting techniques and the frescoes. The use of three tier system, the cruciform plan form, altar, choir on sepulchers etc, which mark the mature style.

Following this, the next change brought forth in history by the French builders, who meticulously passed the new and novel style of Gothic Architecture. Spectacular achievements made by Gothic in terms of the skeletal skin and the use of flying Butresses, a technique unknown earlier. New vaulting system named as ribbed and paneled vault, use of stained glass windows and other features involved in Gothic Architecture.

The final part of the study culminates with Renaissance style which essentially began as a new art movement and later found its way through church furniture and tombs and later integrates herself into architecture. Study of the early phase, then the middle phase and later the final version of the style with personalities responsible for each period and their major contribution.
